John was one of the Rotary International PolioPlus representatives at the UN Special Session on Polio Eradication in 2012 and attended 2014 Rotary Day at the UN. John is a polio survivor (Class of 1953), paralyzed from his neck down for 6 months just prior to the Salk Vaccine distribution and now uses a wheelchair for most of his daily mobility. John has given Polio talks to Rotary clubs, District Conferences, RYLA, Interact & Rotaract clubs throughout the Northeast USA. John is the former owner of Paper And Ribbon Supply Company; board member of the Polio Network of NJ/DE; a 26-gallon platelet donor; and a volunteer driver for Mobile Meals of MOT.
