

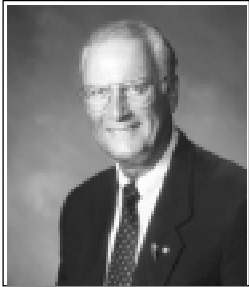

ROTARY RECREATIONAL & VOCATIONAL FELLOWSHIPS

Rotary has a unique opportunity for you to contact and participate in your recreational or vocational interests to supplement our normal Rotary programs.

We presently have about 40 Recreational Fellowships and 40 Vocational Fellowships. The Recreational Fellowships include: golf, yachting, flying and just about any other activity of your interest. There is also a Vocational Fellowship for almost any business or profession. If you are a doctor, lawyer or engineer, you can join a fellowship and be in touch with other members of your profession or business worldwide.

All the fellowships publish a complete membership roster and a newsletter on their activities. At the International meeting, many fellowships have a booth which gives members an opportunity to interface in person with other members of their fellowship. Also at the International meeting, most fellowships have their annual general meeting there to make plans for the coming year and review their activities.

In the past, we have had an international committee to oversee the operation of the fellowships but for the last two years, we have had a task force with an extensive network of contacts to promote these various fellowships.

I have been active in the Flying Fellowship since 1968 and served as chairman in 1968-70. I enjoy working with other Rotarians worldwide for the benefit of Rotary and who have an interest in flying. In our District 7690 we have several members of the International Fellowship of Flying Rotarians (IFFR) and past District Governor H. Edward (Ned) Poyser of Pinehurst is a past chairman of this fellowship. There are 22 members of IFFR in our district.

Past District Governor O. Raymond (Ray) Taylor has been very active in the fellowships and is a good resource for information or a program on all of the Rotary Recreational & Vocational Fellowships. Please feel free to contact Ray or myself for additional information.

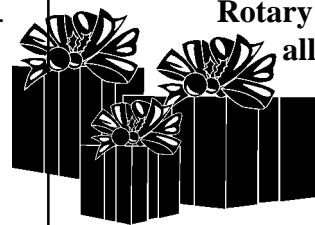
