DISTRICT 7690 WELCOMES ELLIOT I. LOWENSTEIN PRESIDENT'S REP TO 2003 DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Elliot I. Lowenstein, a Certified Public Accountant, graduated from Boston University as a member of the Honor Society of the School of Business Administration. His first 19 years in the accounting profession, he practiced with two firms with emphasis on international accounting, real estate, leisure time industry, health care, and related tax planning.

Elliot's Rotary career began in 1972 in the Rotary Club of South Miami, where he served as secretary and as a multiple year board member. Eight years later, Elliot became a charter member of the Rotary Club of Miami Sundown, a club in which he became president as well as held a number of other offices. Currently, Elliot is a member of the Rotary Club of Miami West.

In District 6990, Elliot has served, either as chair or as a member of numerous committees to include Group Study Exchange Coordinator, Youth Exchange, Finance and Procedures, Rotaract, District Secretary, Assistant Governor as well as District Governor (RI Year 2000/01). Elliot is also a Foundation Alumni having volunteered and participated in multiple matching grants including a \$300,000 3H grant in Trinidad and Tobago for the assistance and training of persons with disabilities. One of Elliot's current responsibilities in District 6990 is the Chairmanship of the Polio Eradication Committee.

In November 2000, Elliot chaired the Host Committee for the RI North American Presidential Conference in Miami, Florida. Elliot has served as Zone 34 Coordinator for the Family Values Task Force and as a two year Trustee for the Rotary GridIron Classic Committee. He is presently Zone 34 Coordinator for the Avoidable Blindness Tasks Force and also serves as a United States Representative for New Models for Rotary Clubs Pilot Program (a three year commitment).


CALLING ALL INCOMING ROTARY CLUB PRESIDENTS AND OFFICERS

ROTARY LITERACY PROJECT FOR 2003 CONFERENCE

The date for our District Conference is
quickly approaching and I'm sure most of
your club members have heard some rum-
blings concerning the literacy project we are
planning. For those of you who haven't heard,
we are requesting that all Rotarians that plan
on attending the conference (and even those
not attending) purchase one or two books for
elementary school level children grades K-5.
Total cost per member should not exceed
\$10. If you are not attending, I'm sure one of
the members from your club that is attending
would be happy to carry your books to the
conference!

Books can be purchased at your local retail-
ers such as Walden Books, Borders Books or
Wal-Mart. Just ask for books that are desig-
nated for elementary children grades K-5.

The books are being donated to children,
schools and/or other literacy programs in our
host district 7730. I have been in contact with
several of the members and they have
expressed their appreciation for what we are
providing and they have begun the process of
identifying the various organizations that will
most benefit from our literacy project.

Brunswick County is one of the fastest
growing counties in North Carolina. The
pace of growth places strains on many of the
resources of the county, one of them being
enough books for elementary school children.
Please help us demonstrate Rotary's commit-
ment to the fight against illiteracy.

The club has become more active in the elementary and middle schools and have accomplished the following:

1. Under the direction of AG Robert Nunnaley, a group of 6th-8th graders have formed a Rota-Runners Club at New Century Middle School which is an Interact-type club.
2. The club sponsors a "Student of the Month" program at Carthage Elementary.
3. The club sponsors a "Student of the Month" program at High Falls Elementary School.

The club is making a strong effort to increase membership by hosting a cookout that brought in two new members. The club sponsored a successful golf tournament that raised enough money for the scholarship program for high school seniors at Union Pines High School. Through a matching grant with Rotary International, the club has placed benches throughout the park. The benches have the Rotary emblem. The club also assisted twelve needy families in the area. The club will hold its annual pancake supper in March.

The club began the year with a visit to the Durham Bulls ball park for fellowship and a baseball game. At Christmas the club celebrated with an "Old Fashioned Christmas Celebration" with dinner, caroling and grab bags for all. In October the club hosted the annual Holly Arts Street Festival where members sold chances to a raffle and awarded more than 20 prizes. This raised more than \$1,200 for Polio Eradication. The club has sponsored several blood drives with the Red Cross. The club also sponsors a regular Saturday "Road Kill" clean up program with area Rotaract students.

The club's initial effort to support the repair of children's hearts in Nicaragua in an effort with the Duke University Medical Staff has blossomed now to include 7 clubs in the district. Many children are now being given a chance at living much longer, and the parents are learning how to better care for their children.

It has been my pleasure to work with such great Rotarians and friends over the past two years. Serving as Assistant Governor under PDGx2 Stuart Fountain and Governor Henry Brown has also been very rewarding, as I have seen what Rotary does in a whole new way. I encourage anyone who is interested in learning more about Rotary to step up and become more involved. Club sponsorship or support of Tour de Moore Bike Ride, Christmas Tree sales, and Salvation Army bell ringing has raised over \$9,000 for community and Rotary projects. The club has sponsored a Shadow Day. The club collects food from its members for the Sandhills Coalition once a month. Internationally, the club participates in Saving Hearts Project and has initiated a project to obtain computers for a youth organization in India. As to support of the Foundation, each member has pledged \$100 to and the club has designated \$1,000 for, the Polio Eradication Campaign, aggregating over \$5,000. Each member has also pledged \$100 a year to be a Paul Harris Fellow sustaining member. Also this year four members have become benefactors of RI. This year the club responded to the needs of residents in North Moore County, particularly in Robbins, by conducting a clothing drive and providing over 1,500 pounds of food. The club has also instituted a Spring Golf Marathon to raise funds for Moore County Red Cross.
