My recent activity has included preparation for Gold club Award recognition, and other discussions about recognition, prizes, and awards. It's always fun to contemplate being recognized, especially by one's peers. Then my attention was turned to the month of February in our Rotary world, and I recalled February being World Understanding Month. Not a moment too soon I thought, as I began to contemplate our current state

of affairs, and to appreciate how precious World Understanding really is. What a prize it would be if only we better understood those in the world who are different from us. Those who have had the opportunity to travel to other countries, or to host visitors from other countries, will no doubt recall as I do the value that comes as you begin to learn and then understand others. Much of what one learns is rich and rewarding, while at the same time one occasionally also learns that with which we do not agree. But we understand. It is not required that we agree.

All of this calls to mind the opportunities Rotary offers to actually do something to cultivate World Understanding. Rotary Is What Rotary Does, and today would be a good time to start by identifying a worthy recipient of an Ambassadorial or Cultural scholarship, and encouraging that person to apply. These persons contribute greatly to our ability to understand our world, as do World Peace Scholars. Others participate in Youth Exchange, and do the same. It's a bit late for this year, but next fall you could make a point of sharing the Youth Exchange opportunity with your high school students, and helping interested ones apply. A Group Study Exchange team will soon leave for Mexico, and we will welcome a visiting team here in April-May. Take time to meet these team members (they will be at District Conference April 22-25 in Asheville), to befriend them, and share with them the world understanding we each bring to the other. (Several of us contemplated in a recent meeting how much more we could do with TWO GSE teams each year rather than just one.)

Then of course there are projects of every type and kind to be undertaken in cooperation with clubs in other countries, and with the support of matching grants. Our web site will soon join others that already provide information on project opportunities. And what better way to promote World Understanding than to work along side a Rotarian from another country, knowing you share Rotary in common, and at the same time sharing the diversity that you each represent to the other. The time to start is now, especially for projects that may be the subject of matching grants for

April 22-25, 2004 Asheville, NC

Rotary Youth Leadership

The Rotary Youth Leadership Program at Guilford College will be held July 18-24, 2004. The program, sponsored by the Greensboro Rotary Club, in cooperation with the Center for Creative Leadership in Greensboro, is in its twenty-first year. The program provides 54 selected high school juniors and seniors throughout Rotary District 7690 an opportunity to develop effective and responsible leadership skills.

The program will again be held on the Guilford College Campus, utilizing the College's dormitory, cafeteria and recreational facilities. David Clem of the Greensboro Rotary Club is Program Director. Staff leadership advisors are outstanding college students from North Carolina who previously participated in the program. In addition to the professional staff of the Center for Creative Leadership, other program staff will be representatives of the business and professional community. Prominent state and local leaders will visit and speak with participants and assist in self-assessment of career potentials and goals.

Each participant is nominated by his/her high school principal, reviewed by the local Rotary Club Selection Committee with final selection made by the Program's Executive Committee. Program participants will not be restricted by race, sex, religion or national origin.

Participants are sponsored by local Rotary Clubs for the entire cost of the program, including room and board. For nomination, a student must have shown leadership capability and maintained a "B" average in school. Interested rising juniors or seniors should contact their high school principals or local Rotary Club for information on the Program.

We will also raise monies to donate nine (\$1000) Scholarships to incoming college freshmen from our three local high schools.
