The job market is a very competitive place these days. Those with good jobs are hanging on for dear life and those without are hoping to land something worth keeping. With that kind of competition, how can Rotary convince young people that Rotary is the organization for them?

Rotary has to be involved in the community. Young people are not interested in joining a meet-and-eat club.

They would, however, be interested in joining an organization that is making the community a better place to do business. They would be interested in an organization that is making the community a better place to rear a family.

Secondly, Rotary has to be involved in the world. We live and work in a global economy. International social upheaval is not conducive to economic well-being. Rotary's mission of international understanding, good will and peace is just what the global economy needs. Young people would like to be a part of that.

This is Vocational Service month in Rotary, and Rotary does a good job with vocational programs. Many of our clubs are involved with job shadowing, SCORE, Junior Achievement, student guests and many other vocational activities. A lot of clubs have job talks where the members explain what it is that they do. One vocational activity that ties in with membership is a classification survey. Going through the phone book and listing certain jobholders as potential members is a great way to canvass the community for Rotarians. Doing a classification survey among students could focus their attention on what they might like to do after graduation.

A few years ago, one of our clubs videotaped their members as they talked about what their jobs entailed. They discussed the educational requirements for their careers; the vocational preparation needed, the skills, the personality types--all the things that go into starting and building a successful career. Copies of the tapes were made for all the high schools in the county and given to the school counselors. When the counselor was talking with a student about a particular career, here was a tape of someone who had been there and done that. The schools found the tapes to be a valuable resource in vocational counseling.

As business leaders, Rotarians share their skills and expertise through vocational service, one of the Four Avenues of Service. Your vocational service efforts can play a vital role in improving the quality of life for those hardworking members of the community who need direction and expertise. by participating in any of a number of vocational service activities - mentoring, career days, vocational awards, business assistance, or even talking about your job experience into an invaluable resource for others.

Why Do I Feel So Pressured As A New President?

Every new Rotary president gets "bombarded right up front with information." The first two months seem like a truck from Office Depot is constantly pulling up with five shelves of information. The PETS Training is an excellent instructional program for incoming presidents. The first few months for any club president are always difficult. It is important that the club president have the officers, directors, and committee chairmen appointed before the new year begins. Having co-chairmen for committees will help build support within the club. Focus on these initial items: (1) Get your budget to the Board of Directors early; (2) Make sure your program chairman has speakers and dates ready to publish in the club bulletin; (3) Announce club activities at least six to eight weeks before the event; and (4) Get as much interaction and flow within the meetings as possible. It is also important to club members to stay on time and stay within the hour time frame for club meetings.
