I'm sure you will find this hard to believe, but there seems to be some misunderstanding about the Presidential Citation of 04-05. I know what you are thinking - what could possibly be confusing about a Rotary award? There are only a few thousand of them and they all make perfectly good sense in some form or fashion. The Presidential Citation, however, is the big one and could stand a little clarification. It reads: to receive the 2004-05

Presidential Citation, clubs will undertake a well-rounded program of activities within each of the four Avenues of Service. Determine the number of activities your club must undertake based on the size of your club's membership according to the following chart: 50 or fewer members, 2 accomplishments; 51-150, 3 accomplishments and so on (the form is available on our website, [www.rotary7690.org](http://www.rotary7690.org)) Select activities under the Opportunities for Services listed in this brochure and achieve them between July 1, 2004 and April 1, 2005. Complete the Presidential Citation Certification Form and send it to your district governor.

Here's the confusing part: for a club of 50 or fewer members, is it two accomplishments in each of the Four Avenues of Service for a total of eight accomplishments or is it two accomplishments total? And the answer is: it's two accomplishments in each of the areas for a total of eight. However, there is a wide range of activities that can be accomplished to qualify for the citation. For example, in the club service area, there is starting a new Rotary Club, a formidable task. There is also the appointment of a Family of Rotary committee, not so difficult a task. In fact, as you look through these accomplishments, a lot of them are being done anyway for Gold Club. So the Presidential Citation should be a piece of cake. Take the time to fill out the paperwork, send it in and next year when Governor Phil is making his rounds, he will be presenting your club the Centennial Presidential Citation to hang on your wall, an adornment any self-respectful wall would be glad to have.

I'm sure you will also find this hard to believe, but there is a new award on the Rotary horizon--The Rotary Centennial Service Award for Professional Excellence. This is an unusual Rotary award in that it is for non-Rotarians. It is intended to recognize exceptional community representatives, who may not have been exposed to the work and values of Rotary, yet their dignified ideas are similar to Rotary. Candidates should be established members of their profession, demonstrate high ethical standards, have achieved professional distinction, have experience training and/or mentoring others in their profession and have a record of community service.

If you know of such non-Rotarians and would like to nominate them for this award, write up their qualifications and submit them to me by March 22, 2005. Hope your holidays are merry. Happy Rotary for 2005, the birthday year.

## *Family of Rotary*

Glenn E. Estess Sr., 2004-05 Rotary International President, has retained *The Family of Rotary* as a major initiative of Rotary this year. The initiative encourages clubs to care for Rotarians and members of Rotary's extended family (spouses, children, parents and the spouses of deceased Rotarians) and for families in the communities in which we live. December is *The Family of Rotary* month so look for special ways to include family members in club activities this month.

Rotary International website ([www.rotary.org](http://www.rotary.org)) has lots of great suggestions. Search under *Family of Rotary* for a complete list. And here's another idea, just for clubs in District 7690:

**Celebrate National Family Week.** Founded in 1968 by Sam Wiley, who was a teacher and administrator in Indianapolis, National Family Week is celebrated every year during the week of Thanksgiving and recognizes that strong families are at the center of strong communities and a strong country. According to Peter Goldberg, president and CEO of the Alliance for Children and Families, the major sponsor of the celebration, "Ordinary families are extraordinarily important to our communities and our country. When America's diverse families and children are healthy, our nation prospers. That's why we hope everyone will take time during National Family Week to honor the connections that support and strengthen families year-round."

During December, find a speaker from your community to speak to your club about "the state of the family," or about a family issue of special importance to you. This may point the way for your club to become engaged in a community activity or special event that supports strong families--Rotarians extending their compassion for their own families to the communities in which they live.

## CLEMMONS ROTARY CLUB BUILDS HOUSE FOR CHARITY

Clemmons Rotarians have undertaken their largest project --building a 2,400 square-foot house in the Stonecroft subdivision in Clemmons. The house will be sold, and the proceeds donated to several charitable organizations. Ron Davis who has 10 years experience in the construction business is the club's chairman. The house is currently under construction. Davis said donations and discounts have come from realtors, heating, air, electrical contractors, masons and a brick company, lumber companies, grading and landscaping contractors, painters, sheetrock installers, and insurance company, attorneys and waste services. A list of contributors is posted on a large sign in the front yard of the new house. Members of the Clemmons Rotary Club furnish the grunt work each Saturday which involves disposing of building debris, sweeping and keeping the new house clean. The house has an appraised value of \$285,000 and will be finished in approximately 30 days. Some of the charities that will benefit from this project are: Cystic Fibrosis, scholarship programs, Make-A-Wish Foundation, Hand-In-Hand program for youth, and other worthy causes.

## SUMMIT CLUB SPONSORS 7690 FELLOWSHIP AT SEA (INAUGURAL EVENT)

The inaugural Fellowship at Sea cruise just concluded with a marvelous trip to Bermuda. Sixty Rotarians and their guests from across District 7690 returned Saturday, October 2 from a week-long cruise to Bermuda. They cruised aboard Celebrity Cruise Lines Horlizon, which sailed from Norfolk, Va. on Saturday, September 25 and made port calls at St. George and Hamilton in Bermuda. The weather was warm and sunny for the entire trip, adding to the enjoyment of all. This inaugural event was sponsored by Summit Rotary, with Rotarians Steele Smith and Kay Allred acting as co-chairs for the event. The idea was to promote greater fellowship and cooperation among clubs throughout the District and to raise money for club projects. While all accounts are not yet settled, organizers believe that more than \$4,000 was raised to be distributed on a pro-rate basis among participating clubs. The following clubs had members and guests participating: Summit, Greensboro Airport, Crescent, Furnitureland, Stratford, Reidsville, Carthage, Sanford and Jonesboro.

Due to the strong encouragement of many across the District, Summit has already committed to sponsoring a second Fellowship at Sea event. It will be a cruise to Alaska, with an option to add a "Heart of Alaska" land tour. This trip will sail from Vancouver, BC on July 15, 2005 for a 7-day Alaskan Cruise. The land tour will come at the end of the cruise and add four nights to the trip. Information is being disseminated to Club Presidents now and follow-up club visits will be scheduled shortly. Tour space is very limited; those interested in the combined cruise/tour package are encouraged to contact Kay Allred at 336-664-0600 as soon as possible to ensure they are able to make a reservation.
