DG Don Allred Introduces DGE Phil Morris as the Incoming Governor 2005-06 Rotary District 7690

Phil Morris was invited to join the Rotary Club of Furnitureland in 1978 to fill the classification of Public Library Administration. He was asked to edit his club's newsletter in 1979 and to launch its website, www.FurniturelandRotary.org in 1998. He was elected club president for 1999-2000. He and his wife Karen, have served on several District Conference committees. Phil was appointed as Assistant Governor for the Greater High Point area in 2001-2002 and again in 2002-2003.

In 1987 he organized the first District 7690 Club Bulletin Exchange, a project that has evolved into the formation of the District Club Bulletin Committee. In 1999 he developed the district's website, <u>www.Rotary7690.org</u>, which was recognized at the RI Convention in San Antonio as the best website in Zone 33 for 2001. He manages the District's e-mail network. In 2001 he was asked to develop a website for Rotary Fellowships. The website <u>www.RotaryFellowships.org</u>, has been recognized by Rotary International as a resource for the Rotary Fellowships program.

Phil was born in New Haven, Connecticut. He attended Central Methodist College in Fayette, Missouri and received his Masters of Library Science from Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, New York. He returned to Central Methodist College as Director of Libraries. He also served on the staff of the High Point Public Library. He served for many years on the executive committee of the High Point Chamber of Commerce's Leadership:High Point program. His wife, Karen, is a charter member of the Oak Hollow Rotary Club in High Point, serving as club president in 2004-2005. They are Paul Harris Fellows, benefactors, and charter members of the Rotary Foundation's Bequest Society. Their hobbies include photography, web design, music and travel, and, apparently, Rotary!

REPORT FROM THE OUTBOUND GSE TEAM

Well, we have been here two weeks and have two weeks to go. We are all staying in a hotel in Koln and have just come from the church service at the Dom. It was simply amazing. We have met many great families and have had some wonderful hosts for day trips. This trip has taught me a lot about Germany and myself.

My first host family in Bad Berleburg, the Eigner's were great - they were very accomodating and I had my own small room with a bathroom nearby. For my first time out of the states, and the first time staying in a home with strangers, this family of 5 made it easy on me. They were extremely patient with my lack of German language skills. Plus, Tim was right down the hall from me if we ran into a problem that poor German and hand gestures could not work out. Their youngest child was named Carolina (pronounced Carolena) and she was adorable. The mother did not work (as quite a few do not when small children are at home) and the father ran a pharmacy on the ground level of the home. Pharmacists in Germany are on call 24 hours a day. Their 12 year old son was able to drink wine with dinner and eat Mon Cheri's (a very strong liquor candy).

(This host family also 'broke me in' to the norms of life in Germany. Duvet covers and one pillow... one towel... lunch meat and cheese and bread for breakfast with tea or very strong coffee... women in submissive roles, although it is changing... no women in Rotary, except for three clubs across the entire area of Germany... not everyone has a computer... the z and the y are interchanged on the German Keyboard... not everyone knows English)

The second host family in Saarburg, the Ebert's were interesting. Christian and his wife, Andrea ran a winery and their home was the place for wine tastings. They had three girls who were also very cute. Andrea ran the business side (selling, arranging distributors, etc.) while Christian took care of the workers and hosted the wine tastings. The day after we got to the vineyard, Andrea left for a trip to New York to arrange for a distributor to take on their Riseling. So, that left Miranda and me in a home with Christian, his three girls and the girls' Au Pair (nanny) which is something else that most children of business elites have. The home was very large and cold... the beginnings of my cold!

The third host family in Wittlich has been my favorite so far. The Gaenz were so wonderful! Rolf owns and manages a company that makes bottling machines. Rolf and his wife Edilia (she is from LA, California) were super hosts. They have a totally sweet 15 year old daughter who spoke perfect English as well. They asked the questions that we expected and were open to my views. I learned in this home that every business in Germany must be a member of the Chamber of Commerce. The Gaenz see this as not a good thing and didn't feel like they got anything out of it. The Chamber here is a government organization that does a lot of the things we do but, it combines with all the business organizations as well. The Chamber of Commerce in Frankfurt has 100 employees.

The fourth host family, I also shared with Miranda. This was the home of the Kellerman's. Christian Kellerman and his wife Brigitte have 5 children. The husband farms beets and wheat for beer. They have 100 hectars of land. The home was a very large, cold place - full of family history. Miranda and I were on the third floor of the home.. in rooms normally for the maid. This family has one nanny and one maid. They were interesting, as well.

CLUB NEWS from Area 10

The Siler City Rotary Club's annual fund raising event for Chatham Hospital was held last Fall, and generated approximately \$40,000 for the hospital.

The Club held its annual cash raffle on May 7. The raffle was very successful with around 200 people attending. The raffle was held at the Siler City Moose Lodge. The event was catered by Mattie Clark. Mrs.Clark served Rotarians and citizens of Chatham County Delicious BBQ and chicken pot pie. The event raised about \$13,000 which goes to scholarships, Chatham hospital Womens auxiliary and The Rotary Foundation.

The Jonesboro, San-Lee, and Sanford Rotary Clubs are still working toward a successful International Project with Mexico, a clean water project. The project has run into delays due to "red tape", but hopefully the issues will be resolved quickly.

The three Lee County Rotary Clubs also participated in a joint Centennial Project, which was completed over the winter months. A shelter was built by Rotarians from the three clubs at Sloan Park, a public park with tennis courts. In addition, six beautiful picnic tables made of cypress were built by Rotarians and placed at Depot Park, a new and beautiful public park located in downtown Sanford.

The Rotary District 7690 Manual of Procedure and Policy states that:

Following the announcement no later than June 1 by the District Governor of the recommendation of the Nominating Committee to the clubs, any club in District 7690 may propose by way of resolution naming the candidate (whose name shall have been previously submitted to the Nominating Committee prior to the May 1st deadline) and certifying that the candidate meets the qualifications established by RI. If challenge candidates are received, the procedures for a mail ballot are determined by the Nominating Committee and ballots are mailed to the clubs. Any challenge must be received by July 1 and should be sent to the office of the District Governor. If no challenges are received by July 1, the candidate of the Nominating Committee shall be declared the DGN. If a mail ballot is necessary, the DG announces the results of the mail ballot by August 1, and the winner shall be declared the DGN.

CONGRATULATIONS TO MORE ROTARY FOUNDATION ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Rotary Club of Willow Creek has become the second club in the world to reach the Triple Crown. The Triple Crown is a district award which recognizes clubs that achieve 100% Paul Harris Fellowship status, 100% Sustaining Members and 100% Benefactors. Congratulations to Willow Creek.

The Rotary Club of Graham has achieved the 100% Paul Harris Fellow status and is #592 in the world for this accomplishment. District 7690 now has 25 clubs that have reached this mark.

The Rotary Club of Crescent was recognized as the first club in the world to achieve the Triple Crown in *The Rotarian* magazine in February, 2005.
