Peace For the Holidays

I have been a Rotarian for over 22 years and Wednesday morning, January 11, 2023, between the hours of 9:00 – 10:30, is in my mind the most inspiring and insightful hour and a half, thus far, in my Rotary journey. I was attending the Rotary International Assembly in Orlando, Florida that week. This is a week in which District Governors-Elect from all over the world come to intense training and it is the last big training to prepare for our year as District Governor. There were two speakers on the agenda for the General Session that morning. One of the speakers was Rotary International President, Gordon McInally. Two days earlier, Gordon had introduced the theme for this year, "Create Hope in the World," and he was doing a deep dive into what the theme meant to him. He said that "creating hope" is about "creating peace" both in the world and, most importantly, "in ourselves". "Peace in the world," he explained, "can only happen when we have peace within ourselves!" Then he went on to tell of the death of his younger brother, Ian, to suicide in 2014 and that our focus this year was going to be on mental health. However, just before Gordon spoke, Ian Riseley, who is Chair of The Rotary Foundation Board, spoke. In his speech, he said something I will always remember. "I am going to say this because some of you District Governor-Elects need to hear it. There are more important things in life than Rotary!"

This hit me because one month earlier I came to the same realization. It was just before Christmas last year and, as all of us do, I had so much going on in my life. My wife and I were preparing for Christmas at our home. We were also deep in a program my business has done for several years called "Be a Santa to a Senior," which provides gifts for senior adults in need at Christmas. Last year we provided almost 600 gifts. Also, we were trying to finish up a home renovation project which had us displaced since a couple of weeks before Thanksgiving. I cannot remember a more frustrating and unrestless time in my life. One afternoon all of these concerns came to a head as I was preparing to attend a district Rotary function. At one point in the afternoon, after feeling stress, guilt, and anxiety about all that was going on I had a "come to Jesus meeting" with MYSELF. I asked myself, "What is one thing you can do today to find peace with yourself?" What did I feel would bring me peace.....skip the district Rotary function, which for me would have required many miles of travel. So, on that afternoon in December, when I was feeling such anxiety, I said, "No," to Rotary and found peace. I think Ian and Gordon would be proud. I love Rotary and I in my speech to all the clubs this Fall I talk about how Rotary has made a positive impact on me both personally and professionally. However, there are more important things in life than Rotary.

Therefore, as your District Governor, I am declaring December as a month of PEACE and to focus on your mental health. I challenge you to focus on things that bring peace to you. Your faith (whatever that might look like), your family, friends, people you work with, and whatever will bring you joy this holiday season. As far as the district goes, in December I am canceling our

monthly AGs meetings and monthly Leadership Lounge meetings.....we'll see you in January. There will also be no district newsletter in December. This too will resume in January. I am encouraging other district leaders to do the same. However, since there are things we need to give attention to from now to the end of the calendar year, you will be receiving an email once a week, except for the week of December 25. Also, I have asked Karen Pollard to continue her Peer Hope Group meeting on December 13 at 11:00. This will be a great mental health resource if you need help dealing with the stress of the holidays.

As we focus this year on "Creating Hope in the World" and creating peace with ourselves, my hope for you is that you will find peace this holiday season.

So You Wanna Be On A Podcast?

Hi everyone! Club President Connolly Walker here from the Pittsboro Rotary Club. I'm excited to share with you all some insight into how the Rotary Interview on The Chatham Park Podcast came to be.

Earlier this year at PETS, one of my breakout session topics was Public Image. I didn't think I would learn anything new here because the Pittsboro Rotary Club has a great Public Image Plan. But I was wrong. Someone brought up podcasts.

A podcast is a form of audio programming. Often, a podcast is broken down into episodes around a particular topic or theme. Podcasts are consumed by an audience via an app like Apple, Spotify or Google. It's kind of like radio shows, but a podcast episode is a bit longer (usually 30 minutes to 1 hour), more conversational, more frequent (usually episodes "drop" weekly or monthly), and best of all....it can cover ANY topic.

As someone who has had a dream to have a podcast, this idea was intriguing to me. Could I podcast about Rotary?? Since I'm so new to the game, I knew the first step would be finding a podcast where I could be interviewed about Rotary.

Here in Pittsboro we are watching <u>Chatham Park</u>, a master-planned community come to life. Somewhere in my network, I learned about <u>The Chatham Park Podcast</u>. There it was...a chance to be a guest on a podcast!

I reached out to the producer of The Chatham Park Podcast, and I directly asked, "Can I come on the podcast to talk about our Rotary Club's Street Fair fundraiser?" I was told The Chatham Park Podcast episodes are recorded to talk about projects, businesses, policies, etc. that directly effect Chatham Park and the residents here. I think the producer was a little hesitant with my request, and rightfully so. Could you imagine if everyone in town wanted to come on to promote whatever they wanted to promote? I was asked, "How is the Pittsboro Rotary Club important to the people that live in Chatham Park?"

I answered right back, "Because you're building all these neighborhoods for people to come and live in Pittsboro, but something like the Pittsboro Rotary Club is going to KEEP them living here."

With that answer, I was in. The producer emailed me about 5 questions he thought we might cover. Per his suggestion, I didn't write a script; I just brought with me 1 sheet of paper with some key dates & statistics about Rotary.

I had a blast recording the podcast! It was truly just a conversation. The element of "messing up" was removed, I knew the producer could edit or delete out any mistakes, or we could just "re-record" a statement if I needed. The producer asked great questions, and I really felt like the Pittsboro Rotary Club and Rotary International got to shine throughout the podcast.


