Mother Teresa, Comfort, Care and Rotary Connections

Mother Teresa lived at a time when nearly 70 percent of the people in Calcutta lived below the poverty line. Surrounded and moved by these dire circumstances she founded the Kalighat Home for the Dying. The following story demonstrates the depth of her love and care for everyone.

Mother Teresa came across a man on the street in Calcutta, barely alive and covered in sores and fifth. Instinctively, she knelt beside him, gently lifted him up and carried him to the Sisters of Kalighat Home for the Dying, who care for the destitute in their final days. Once there, Mother Teresa and the Sisters bathed him, dressed his wounds and spoke to him softly. Apparently, he had not been spoken to with kindness in years. The man looked up at Mother Teresa and said, "I have lived like an animal, but I will die like an angel, loved and cared for."



Is your Rotary club providing enough comfort and care to your club members? Connection and fellowship are one of the top reasons why people join and stay in Rotary. Creating a culture where members feel valued, seen and supported is critical to retaining members. Below are three key strategies to consider implementing.

- <u>Create a Care and Comfort Team</u> Comfort and care team members volunteer to contact and aid members who are ill, grieving or going through personal challenges.
- Form a Mentorship Program Veteran Rotary members guide and partner with new members, ensuring new members are aware of leadership, networking and service opportunities in the club.
- 3) Establish a Rotary Educational Team Team members provide information on leadership and knowledge-based opportunities and arrange participation in Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI), networking events or webinars on current topics. Ensure members are aware of the Rotary educational events offered at club, area, district, zone and international levels

As Mother Teresa demonstrated, "It is not how much we do, but how much love we put in doing. Not how much we give, but how much love we put in the giving."



City opens new sensory garden

HIGH POINT - Organizers of the new Rotary Club of High Point Sensory Garden said it's designed to be an oasis of calm in the middle of the city.

The outdoor expanse on the High Point Public Library campus includes features to stimulate the senses and opportunities to make new discoveries, said Jim Zola, a retired children's librarian who came up with the idea several years ago.

"We want to serve as many diverse populations as we can. The city of High Point is very diverse," he said. "So, I saw the opportunity to serve blind people, deaf people, people on the spectrum, people who are suffering from dementia or Alzheimer's. And, for kids to be outside more - a little less screen time, and it's a safe environment here. So, they can enjoy the books inside and come out and enjoy the fresh air and explore in the garden."

The city held a grand opening for the sensory garden Wednesday.

The Rotary Club gave the lead naming donation of \$100,000 as a gift to the community for its centennial project.

The city combined construction of the sensory garden with a new beautification project for the library entrance in a total expenditure of just over \$1.02 million, with donations and grant funding totaling \$823,537, and \$218,258 from city sources.

"We're excited. It took a while, particularly with COVI'D, but we got it done," said Wil Elder, who led the fundraising as chairman of the High Point Library Foundation board.

The space includes a central water feature with a giant floating ball, "because, particularly on a quiet day, you can hear the water, and it just helps with the whole mood of walking through the garden," Elder said. "What's great about it is the kids can push (the ball) around. Even though it weighs thousands of pounds, it floats on the water. So, you can redirect it. It's a fun central feature."

There is also a smaller water feature, a children's play area and an herb wall.

"When that really grows and it gets a little warmer, you'll be able to smell all the herbs as you walk through the garden," he said. "A lot of it was planted just last week. So, in another month, you're going to have a lot more flowers, a lot more scent."
